
How would you teach young children about the history of the Chumash?

This is a *tomol* a canoe built from Redwood trees built by the Chumash central to their heritage as they traveled to the islands.



El Rinconcito de los Libros de la Dra. Perez Dr. Perez Book Corner



November is Native American Heritage month and *"We Are Water Protectors"* written by Carole Lindstrom and illustrated by Michaela Goede (both of Native American descent) is a book that allows young readers to gain insight into Objiwe culture and the Dakota Access Pipeline protests from a young Native American girl's perspective. Through the book, children will be able to learn about the significance of water in Objiwe culture, why it's important to protect water and the Earth from pollution, and about how activists work to conserve our natural environments and its resources. Early educators can utilize this book to extend young children's knowledge of Native American cultures, brainstorm how young children can play a role in environmental conservation, and to discuss what our young students can do to become activists themselves, such as co-writing a letter as a class to the appropriate political representatives.

Día de los Muertos (Day of the Dead) is typically celebrated on November 1st or 2nd (varies by country) and, "Yo Recuerdo a Abuelito: Un Cuento del Día de los Muertos (Spanish and English Edition)" written by Janice Levy and illustrated by Loretta Lopez gives young readers a glimpse into the significance behind celebrating the Day of the Dead. For many in the Latinx community Día de los Muertos is an annual opportunity to celebrate loved ones who have passed. This book invites young learners to explore how different cultures and people within the Latinx community (especially from Mexican and Central American descent) grieve and understand death. Día de los Muertos is seen as an opportunity to celebrate, honor, communicate, and remember loved ones who have passed. This book therefore enables early educators to be inclusive of the cultural norms and traditions that might be celebrated amongst their young Latinx learners and their families. The book also enables educators to support the linguistic assets of both English and Spanish speaking students through the book's multilingual narrative.

My name is Carol Paasch and I have been teaching in the field of Special Education since 1973 – I call it the "Dark Ages" because this was even before IDEA was passed into law, before it was even mandatory to educate children with special needs. As a result, I feel I have a unique perspective on how much our profession has grown throughout the years. I remember my first year of teaching with elementary aged children then referred to as EMR (educable mentally retarded – so glad terms have become more respectful!!) that I lost all the eyelashes in one eye from stress. Even my supervisor did not know how to support me. It was a rough beginning for this, at the time, new field in education. Society has become much more mindful that someone with a disability is a person first, with wants, desires, and preferences just as anyone else.

I worked for the Ventura County Office of Education for almost 20 years here in Camarillo, retiring in 2017 but still subbing when I can. I have a credential and MA Degree in Early Childhood Special Education with a concentration in autism. I have learned so much from working with this population and their families. Just observing how a child problem solves will often help to develop activities and strategies to enhance the child's learning. I am a true believer in inclusion, always having typically developing children in my classroom. It is amazing to watch the growth of all children when they interact with each other in a shared environment. The typical child learns things from the child with an IEP that they never would learn in a gen ed classroom. I have taught here at CSUCI since 2012 in the ECS and SPED Departments. I have learned a great deal while here at CI. I never thought I would be able to teach a class online – but with a lot of support – I have been doing that for several years now!

I was born in Kodiak, Alaska. My father was in the Navy, so we moved just about every 2 years. I spent almost 12 years in Germany as my husband, Wolfgang, is German and both of our children were born in Germany. I also lived in Argentina - one of my most favorite places to live! I have 2 grandchildren. I love to sew and find time to sew every day. It is truly my "Zen" time.

PROJECT IDEA scholar at the University of Oregon

Funding is available for scholars' full tuition, fees, books, travel, and ongoing professional development to become a Project IDEA scholar today! Scholars participate in specialized training and mentorship aimed toward serving infants, toddlers, and preschoolers with disabilities from historically marginalized and underserved communities of the United States, including children of color and those who are indigenous, immigrants, and/or who speak languages or language varieties other than standardized American English.

Scholars must commit to attend weekend summer workshops and complete their student practica in Oregon. After graduating, scholars also commit to 2 years of service to children with disabilities for each year of funding received. Scholars in early intervention can complete their master's degrees and obtain licensure while working via <u>our distance program</u>. Due to the nature of the federal funding, only US citizens or permanent residents are eligible to apply.

To be considered, please submit a letter of interest in Project IDEA that (a) describes your personal and/or professional experience, interest, and intent to serve infants, toddlers, and/or preschools with disabilities from diverse cultural and linguistic backgrounds, and (b) specifies if you identify as a person with a disability, a person of color, a person who speaks a language or language variety other than standardized American English, a person who is the first in their immediate family to graduate college, and/or a person who is a primary caregiver for an individual with disabilities. Through this opportunity, Project IDEA seeks to expand higher education opportunities among students of color, students who speak languages other than English, and students with disabilities. Preference will be given to students who self-identify with these backgrounds. Send this letter by the general application deadline to Dr. Lauren Cycyk (January 15th for speech-language pathology applicants; lcycyk@uoregon.edu) or to Dr. Lillian Durán (February 1st for early intervention applicants; lduran@uoregon.edu). Completion of the general application for both programs is also required by the deadline to be considered. For speech-language pathology, see the general application instructions here.
