OCTOBER HEAD START AWARENESS AND NATIONAL BULLYING PREVENTION

Did you know that October is a special month to raise awareness about two important issues related to children, families, and education?

October is Head Start Awareness Month. Head Start and Early Head Start programs provide early learning, health, and family well-being services to children from birth to age 5 in communities across the country. 

ECS STAR STUDENT *YASMINA MARTINEZ*

I was born with Cerebral Palsy, left side hemiplegic, and a learning disability.

Throughout my life, I have had to work twice as hard in my studies, creating Individualized Education Plans (IEPs) from elementary school through high school. As I entered college, the school provided me extra time to take tests, note-taking devices to assist with my studies, and recordings of my lectures. In the beginning, I relied heavily on these tools. However, over time, I have adapted and now primarily use the extra time for tests.



I have learned to take my own notes using note-taking devices and have figured out what is important to include in my notes. It is possible to achieve anything you set your mind to. One of my goals was to stop relying on these extra supports and learn to manage independently, and I succeeded! I am grateful that I still have the option of assistance from the Disability Accommodations Support Services (DASS) if I need it. DASS is an excellent program for students with diverse disabilities.

In the fall of 2014, I was determined to pursue a career in Business Administration because I wanted a good-paying job and I loved math. I enrolled at Moorpark College to complete my associate degree, taking classes such as entrepreneurship, accounting, and management. After six years, I graduated with my associate degree in Business Administration in 2021.

ECS STAR STUDENT YASMINA MARTINEZ

I wanted to take a break from school, so I worked at my church's school, where I worked with young children, for about two years. After that, I was accepted at California State University, Channel Islands, to start my bachelor's degree in business administration.. I spent a year trying to study; however, I found myself skipping classes because I was not interested in or happy with this field of study. Since I had been working at my church's school since 2019 and loved working with kids, I decided to change my major to Early Childhood Development in 2024 to pursue my passion. I had to start over, but I knew I wanted to work with children in my heart!

Currently, I am proud to say that I am one year away from graduating with my bachelor's degree in Early Childhood Development! After that, I plan to earn my teaching credential, as I aspire to work at a private school or preschool. One of my goals is to get my master's degree, but one thing at a time. I am always thinking ahead of the game, as my dad always preached to me. Yes, it has been a long journey to get to this point, but it is worth it! Never be afraid to follow your passion. I am so happy that I made this decision because choosing a job you love will make you feel as if you never worked a day in your life.

COMMUNITY SERVICE LEARNING:

TIEMPO DE CUENTOS (STORYTIME) SESSION #1
OVERVIEW AND REFLECTIONS

On Sunday, from 1–2 pm, we launched our first *Tiempo de Cuentos* (Storytime) of the semester at the Broome Library. This service-learning experience, held once a month, offers our ECS teacher candidates the opportunity to engage directly with children and families through shared literacy practices. For this session, we read two classic children's books: *Caps for Sale* by Esphyr Slobodkina and *The Doorbell Rang* by Pat Hutchins. Teacher candidates took turns reading aloud in pairs, with two students sharing the responsibility for each book.

During Caps for Sale, the teacher candidates invited the audience to think mathematically. For example, one candidate asked, "How much does each cap cost?" The audience eagerly responded with "50 cents!" prompting the follow-up: "So with one dollar, how many caps could I buy?" At the end of the story, the group decided to take the math a step further by asking: "How much would it cost to buy all of the peddler's caps?" Together, the participants counted the caps—16 in total. With each cap costing 50 cents, they reasoned that the total would be \$8. Participants explained how they arrived at their answers and showing their thinking.

As we transitioned to The Doorbell Rang, the focus shifted toward prediction and inference. The children were asked, "Who do you think might be at the door?" With each knock, the audience guessed that more visitors might arrive. This set the stage for mathematical idea about division and sharing. Teacher candidates posed the question: "If there are more people at the door, do you think each person will get more cookies, or fewer?" The children correctly reasoned that each person would have fewer cookies to share.

COMMUNITY SERVICE LEARNING:

TIEMPO DE CUENTOS (STORYTIME) SESSION #1
OVERVIEW AND REFLECTIONS

We followed the session with reflective writing, where participants were invited to jot down their thoughts. Some wrote about the value of sharing, others described their favorite kinds of cookies, and still others shared personal memories that the stories brought to mind. Finally we gathered in a circle and shared our writing and drawing or stories with each other. Sitting in this circle reminded us how powerful stories, cuentos, and kesas can be. It brings us together. We look forward to families and children joining us in the upcoming Tiempo de Cuentos sessions. 
